#### Dear Parishioners,

1915 was a year dominated by "the great war." Casualties were high as new weapons and strategies for war were introduced. 1915 saw the introduction of poisonous gas first used by the Germans on the eastern front and then by the British in the west. Airplanes and aerial bombs were also new to this war. In May, a German u-boat sunk the British cruise-liner, the Lusitania, as it traveled from New York to Liverpool. 1198 people were killed including 114 American passengers. The US would stay out of the war until 1917, but support for the war would grow and by the end of the year. President Wilson would order an increase in both active and reserve troops. One horrific note is that 1915 saw the beginning of the Armenian genocide. Armenia was part of the Ottoman Empire and her people were Christian in a Moslem world. Many were dragged from their homes and slaughtered. Others were forced to march to concentration camps in Mesopotamia and Syria. By the end of the war, 1 million out of 2.5 million Armenians had been killed.

Apart from the war, other events in 1915 included the first transcontinental telephone call from New York to San Francisco. Within two months there was commercial phone service from New York to San Francisco, but a 3 minute call cost \$20.70. That year, the U.S. population topped 100 million and the gross national product was \$40 billion. The House of Representatives rejected a bill that would give women the right to vote. On February 12<sup>th</sup> of that year, the first stone of the Lincoln Memorial was set in place.

New inventions that year included pyrex baking ware and Bayer aspirin tablets. The first stop sign appeared on a street in Detroit. Einstein also developed his theory of relativity. Babe Ruth hit is first career homerun for the Boston Red Sox. He would go on to lead them to win the World Series 4 games to 1 over Philadelphia. Frank Sinatra, Billie Holiday, Arthur Miller, Orson Welles, and Thomas Merton were all born in 1915. Booker T. Washington died that year. On February 8<sup>th</sup>, Birth of A Nation premiered. It would gross over 10 million dollars. It was controversial even in 1915 as it glorified a vigilante group known as the Ku Klux Klan. In the fall of that year, the Klan would be revived in Stone Mountain, Georgia. Other notable films included Douglas Fairbanks debut in The Lamb and Charlie Chaplain's film, The Tramp. Edgar Lee Masters would publish his book, Spoon River Anthology, a collection of poems that told the stories of people from a small central Illinois community who now lay buried in the town cemetery. Year-End Giving—We are so grateful for the generosity of our parishioners throughout the entire year. IRA Charitable Rollover— On December 16th,
Congress passed legislation that includes the IRA
Charitable Rollover. Donors age 701/2 and older may
transfer up to \$100,000 from their IRA to a qualified
public charity. The transfer is free of federal income
tax and the gift qualifies as the 2014 required minimum
distribution. The law is for this tax year only at this
point, and will expire on December 31, 2014. Please
contact your IRA administrator if you would like to
make a gift.

As we prepare for 2015, it seems to me that some things have not changed. Despite our advancements in knowledge and technology; war, violence, and injustice continue. There is no doubt when one sees such evil one knows the existence of sin. But there is a story from 1915 that gives a glimmer of hope in a rather bleak year. On Christmas day, along the western front, a truce had been called (A similar truce also happened in 1914). Some soldiers came out of their trenches and offered Christmas greetings to those on the other side. Somehow, a spontaneous game of football began in the no man's land between the two sides. It lasted only a short time before artillery fire brought the truce to an end. The story was revived a few years ago when the last player died. It seemed to say that even in the midst of war and evil, there are glimpses of hope—hope that our world can be redeemed. As we begin 2015, my prayer is that this year will be one of hope.
